Proof of the high standard of play came in that quiet and beautiful interlude, the Pastoral Symphony. Careful training of the strings reaped its reward in this. And the whole performance was enhanced by Frank Berry on the organ.

After the overture, the audience may well have held their breath, for the tenor's opening solo can set the atmosphere for the performance. Mr. William Herbert's "Comfort Ye" gave the audience confidence in choir, orchestra and soloists.

Miss Ada Alsop (soprano) sang her few solos with particularly sweet

her tew solos with particularly sweet tone. He voice was clear and had the strength necessary for a large theatre. "I know that my Redeemer liveth" recaptured the audience's attention after the brilliant climax of the Hallelujah chorus.

The bass soloist's several impor-tant solos were ably sung by Mr. George Allen. The most difficult aria, "The trumpet shall sound," gave full scope for his powerful voice, and he was well supported in this by Mr. Cecil Kidd, playing solo trumpet

trumpet. Miss Muriel Gale (contralto) has a mature and rich voice which seemed at its best in the air, "He was despised," and the recitative, "Behold a Virgin shall conceive."
